Re: Next Steps on Mature and Old-Growth Rulemaking

Dear Tracy Stone-Manning, Randy Moore, John Podesta, Brenda Mallory, and Ali Zaidi,

Thank you for your leadership in ensuring durable protections for mature and old-growth forests on federal lands as a critical natural climate solution in the United States. We are writing to respectfully request that the administration make concrete progress to advance a rulemaking to protect these forests from threats, including logging. As part of this, agency leadership must provide interim direction so that current and planned logging projects do not constrain the development of a mature and old growth forest climate rule.

The Department of Agriculture and Department of the Interior must continue to pursue a rulemaking that will protect mature and old-growth forests and trees, building on USFS's Advanced Notice of Proposed Rulemaking and BLM's proposed public lands rule. In parallel, the Departments must ensure that current and proposed logging projects do not undermine the ability of mature and old-growth forests to act as natural climate solutions under a future rule.

Protecting mature and old-growth trees and forests is a critical climate resilience and mitigation strategy. These trees and forests store the most carbon on the landscape and are often the most resilient to the impacts of climate change, such as worsening wildfire. Further, they protect essential drinking watersheds, mitigate the impacts of flooding, provide critical habitat for threatened and endangered species, and offer numerous cultural and recreational values. Protecting these trees from commercial logging complements agencies' objectives to enhance the climate resilience of our federal forests.

Substantial progress on developing a durable rule, together with interim protections, would represent a clear commitment and progress on this important climate issue. As funding hits the ground from the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act and Inflation Reduction Act to protect communities from the threat of fire, we must ensure mature and old-growth trees are not cut as an unnecessary side effect of certain management activities.
